A TWO WAY STREET

Any relationship requires give and take, support, patience, acceptance, communication, appreciation, trust and most of all, love. Since it is the season of Easter, let's focus on our relationship with God. What is your relationship with God like? It should be a two-way street.

I confess that at times my relationship with God might be one sided. I know that on occasion I've begged and pleaded for a particular outcome to requests I've made via prayer. I have asked for things that I hoped I would get. On occasion I have even bargained with God; if only You would do this or that, then I would do this or that. That's give and take, right? But then on the other side, maybe God has had a hand in bringing about an outcome that I am completely oblivious to until it happens. When that light bulb reaction occurs, I wonder if God has had the guiding hand in the relationship. I shouldn't wonder, He does. I can beg, plead, bargain and hope for what I believe I want and God determines if it is what I should have. He may agree with my plan or go in another direction. Man proposes God disposes. We should know that by now. He is the Father after all. Father knows best. That doesn't mean that your relationship with God shouldn't be a two way street.

Easter is a good time to reevaluate your relationship with God. Each year we are reminded that we have been given a HUGE gift in his son, Jesus Christ, that allows us to make mistakes, push the boundaries, even sin. Being perfectly good all the time is exhausting for some while others may crave the rigid rules and boundaries. I'm not advocating that you let loose and hit the anything goes button. Let's be clear that being bad, really bad, and doing really, really bad things is not acceptable, even if forgiveness is guaranteed. But telling a little white lie or contemplating and acting on some other minor slip from the good side does tend to get the juices flowing, the heart palpitating, and the sweat forming. Kind of like exercising, but a little more devious.

Whatever kind of relationship you have with God, you will be covered for anything you do, good or bad. But do not expect a reward for being good or anything but feeling guilt or worse, punishment, for being bad. Still, it is a relationship that should not be a one-way street. Any relationship is more fulfilling, fruitful, richer and just better when both parties are completely engaged. God is there to guide us, nurture us, pick us up when we fall and most of all forgive us. But we are expected to contribute to this relationship too. Have you thanked God lately with all your heart? Have you shown kindness and care to others in the name of God? Have you loved your neighbor as yourself? Have you been grateful that you need never feel forsaken and that all the blessings you receive come from God? Have you taken the time to nurture your faith in God and be faithful to the Holy Spirit? Have you simply shown love to the One?

Just remember that for any relationship to work you have to be intentional in your communication, support, faith trust and love. With God especially, you really need to find a way to include Him in your daily life, intentionally through prayer or some other personal connection by appreciating everything that surrounds you. Trust that God will be with you as long as you open your heart and mind to His presence. The most important thing to remember in a relationship with God is that God loves you. It's unwavering. Think about what you value most in a relationship and know that your relationship with God has that and so much more. Be all in.

Resurrection Joy: Place and Journey

Dr. Phillip Sheldrake, Senior Research Fellow at Westcott House, Cambridge Theological Federation in his book, Living Between Worlds: Place and Journey in Celtic Christianity, writes about the development of Celtic Christianity starting and mainly existing on the far northwest edges of the known European world. Because of location this strand of Christianity evolved differently from the more settled and urbanized world of Rome. Clare Cooper Marcus writes in her book, *Iona Dreaming*, "Celtic Christians had, and even today have, a strong sense of living on 'edges' or 'boundary places' between the material world and the other world." Sheldrake writes, "the natural landscape was both a concrete reality where people lived and, at the same time, a doorway into another spiritual world. This sense of living in a 'between place' enabled Celtic Christians to make connections between the physical and the intangible, the seen and the unseen, this world and a permanently 'other' world." Sheldrake claims Celtic Christianity has the "twin values of place and journey." Thus an engagement with place may enable an inner spiritual journey. Marcus

speaks of her time on Iona as a deep engagement with the physicality of the island and as a place of pilgrimage and of re-birth. The Rev. Foss Westcott, founder of Westcott House and Bishop of Durham held the incarnation as the central doctrine of the Christian Church. By it God began a new chapter in the redeeming the whole world. This truth is always larger than we can imagine. Christianity is not a religion of thought, but a faith of inbodied actions. He lost his chance to be appointed by Queen Victoria Archbishop of York because he supported coal miners who were striking for better wages and working conditions. His stance combined the Celtic values of place and journey. Celtic Christianity does not place much focus on original sin, but rather on original goodness of human beings expressed in creation. They place a deep emphasis on the incarnation as God beginning again in a new way to renew the entire universe. Thus it is very much about place and journey. A challenge for me is to renew my paying attention to this 'place' and journey and how places and occasions may become recognized 'edges' or 'boundary' places between the material world and the unseen. Perhaps we need to walk our neighborhoods with fresh eyes to see, ready to smell, and willing to touch it, seeing it as a place where God might begin a new resurrection of the Spirit.

Overview of the Welcome * Connect * Strengthen Weekend Workshop "How to Reach New People"

Almost 60 parishioners attended the workshop: How to Reach New People, on Friday night and most of the day on Saturday, March 3rd and 4th. The workshop was led by Jim Griffith and Paul Nickerson from Griffith Coaching, a group that specializes in helping churches understand what it takes to reach new people in today's culture and provide a framework for them to craft an action plan to reintroduce themselves to the greater community.

Over the course of 8 hours we learned that the growth strategies of the 1950's, "waiting for people to come through the doors of our church", is not going to work anymore. We have to use alternative methods of letting people in the community know that we are here. We not only want to connect with them, but form relationships with them. This will ultimately allow them to feel comfortable coming to our church. It is through these relationships that we can find out what it is they are looking for in a church environment and make sure we can provide that.

Most churches today are not the social hubs of the community that they once were, and the culture of going to church is not necessarily the primary focus of people in the community. The strategy is that the clergy and parishioners have to intentionally become visible in the community, with an effort being made to "Leave The Castle," and connect with the people where they are out there. The key to reaching new people is to invite them, pick them up and bring them to church.

The ultimate task of the workshop participants was to write down suggestions on post-it notes that detailed:

- * Where and when the clergy should spend 20% of their time in the community
- * What events we can initiate and take outside the walls of the church

- * When it would be appropriate for ministry groups to relocate their meetings off campus
- * What community events we can attend and make our presence known.

In addition to the framework listed above, a critical aspect of how to reach new people rests on all parishioners. The strategy of being involved in member-guest activities is the foundation of forming new relationships with people in the community. These primarily consist of recreational social events. A parishioner invites a friend, family member, neighbor, co-worker or acquaintance to participate. Doing that will ultimately build a relationship before they might be willing to accept an invitation to come to church.

On Sunday Paul and Jim attended all three worship services in order to evaluate how welcoming we were to guests, how user-friendly our service bulletins and binders were, and how clearly we showed that we were an Episcopal Church. They met with us Sunday and offered a wealth of suggestions on how we might improve on our church experience for guests, which included putting up a sign outside the Great Hall that actually says we are an Episcopal Church.

A vitality group is being formed, composed of about a dozen people, that will be charged with the following:

Preview all the post-it notes, compile them into categories and prioritize the suggestions.

1 Develop an action plan that will dictate how we can implement the

recommendations on reaching new people.

• Oversee the implementation of the action plan, which will be an ongoing project for

many months

₱ Meet via video conference calls on a monthly basis with Paul Nickerson, one of the

workshop presenters, who will be our coach throughout the ongoing process. He

will be assisting us in implementing our action plan and provide us with updated

advice and resources to promote our success at reaching new people.

& Communicate with the congregation on a regular basis of the successes we

encounter and recruit parishioners to participate in ongoing activities defined in the

action plan.

There will be more information forthcoming that will further explain the ways in which

people who currently attend Middleham and St. Peter's can connect with our Southern

Maryland neighbors, welcome them into our parish community, include them in our

ministries, strengthen our parish family and sustain us as we move forward into the

future.

upcoming Wednesday Night Christian Formation opportunities in April and May!



A Report from SMILE

On March 9, SMILE held its annual board meeting. President Bruce Robertson and the officers and committee chairs reported out on a remarkable year of accomplishment. Before reviewing those, here are a few helpful items:

SMILE stands for Service Makes Individual Lives Exciting! Sharing our Middleham campus, SMILE includes eleven member churches and 270 volunteers, many of whom are our own parishioners. Churches include:

SMILE is an all-volunteer operation that draws income from the thrift shop sales (\$275,000 in 2016), contributions, and grants, and supports the community by providing:

- Food to hundreds of families each week at the food pantry
- Fresh produce from the Helpful Harvest Garden on the Middleham campus
- Special food distributions at Easter, July 4, Thanksgiving, and Christmas
- Clothing, furniture, and other items to residents at the thrift shop
- Emergency assistance (utilities, medical, rent, etc.) to over 200 clients
- Grants to 31 families to avoid homelessness
- Health assistance, checking blood pressures and access to care through the new health van
- Employment assistance through the mobile career center
- School backpacks to needy kids for the school year

SMILE President Robertson expressed his appreciation to all the volunteers, and noted these highlights:

- The 25th anniversary of SMILE celebrated in October
- Baccalaureate service provide by SMILE at Patuxent H.S.
- Good Friday procession on Solomons Island

Organ Donation Month

It seems that each month of the year has several titles. Amongst the list for April is Organ Donation. I know we all know about this subject- but I thought I'd give you an update. In 2015- there were 119,000 men, women and children waiting for an organ.

- *22 people die each day while waiting for an organ
- * Nearly 2 out of every 3 people on the waiting list are over the age of 50.
- *Almost 2,000 children under 18 are on the waiting list.
- *Almost 70,000 people (58%) on the list are ethnic minorities.

One person can donate up to 8 lifesaving organs.

Donate Life America was inspired by the concept of the pinwheel for the 2017 National Donate Life Month artwork. A pinwheel evokes various images and meanings, but the strongest association revolves around opportunity and energy.



The pinwheel is symbolic of an instrument that turns obstacles into opportunities. The pinwheel's ability to capture and pass on energy parallels one's potential to make LIFE

possible. Each Donate Life pinwheel has four sails supported by one stem, symbolizing the power one person has to be an organ, eye, tissue or living donor. For recipients, donation can turn sickness and injury into a second chance at life. For donors, their decision to register can turn a sorrowful time into a source of comfort for family as a result of renewed life for others.

The pinwheel reminds us that we all have the potential to capture and pass on life, comfort and hope to others by registering as a donor. This April, we encourage you to stop to feel the breeze, watch the pinwheels and think of the lives of those touched by donation and transplantation.


