DECEMBER 2017 Love Bright and Wild

I recently came across an Advent poem by Madeleine L'Engle that stirred my attention as we approach this season of hopeful expectation.

After Annunciation This is the irrational season When love blooms bright and wild. Had Mary been filled with reason There'd have been no room for the child.

This poem expands my understanding of this season where our readings, music, and prayers invite us to watch, wait, and prepare for Jesus to come among us. We watch and wait for the story of Emmanuel, God with us, crying out from the manger. We watch and wait for Christ to come again, for God's Kingdom to come into its fullness on earth as it is in heaven.

L'Engle's poem reminds me that part of the preparation and waiting we intentionally focus on during Advent is also the willingness to say "Yes." Yes to the unexpected and the irrational. Yes to the inbreaking of love bright and wild into which God calls us. Mary, Joseph, Isaiah, John the Baptist, and others speak to us in our Advent readings with voices that said yes to God in their own way and time. Yes to resisting fear, as they risked and trusted their lives with God.

I'm someone who likes to know what's going to happen next, and often try to prepare for things in such a way that there's little room for something to go awry. Be it planning for a trip, a date night, liturgy, or an afternoon of errands. What's the game plan? What's plan B? What do I know? What can I expect? I'll probably always continue to be this way to some extent. Yet, this poem and this season in the church year remind me that amidst (and perhaps despite) my efforts to prepare and plan, love bright and wild will still show up. And will do so in some way that doesn't fit into my plan for how something is supposed to go.

Sometimes I resist and resent these moments. They can feel like untimely distractions, and I say no. But in those moments when I do set my own agenda aside, and say yes to what's right in front of me, there is often more than enough room, time, and energy for whatever holy detour the Spirit is sending me down. This happens when someone walks through the doors here at Middleham and St. Peter's struggling to make in need of gas, and hopes someone will listen to them. It happens when one of our youth asks a question that I've never thought of before. Love bright and wild shows up when the food distribution delivery is late, and everyone's more than a little on edge. Then we pause for a moment to take one another's hands in prayer.

God loves us with an irrational kind of love. It often invites us to do irrational things, to say yes to that love in ways large and small. What are your "yes" moments? Jesus came into our midst as Emmanuel, as the ultimate "yes" to humanity, reconciliation, and hope. God is with us. God is calling us into love bright and wild. Advent offers us an opportunity to remember this anew.

Treasurer's Corner



This year seems to have flown by and it is already December 2017. Our Stewardship Campaign was a huge success from my way of thinking. I personally thank Laura Carpenter and Colleen Davies for their excellent planning and execution and I really like our new shirts. They are so comfortable. "Thanks for Giving" is not just a slogan, but a sincere Thank You to all of you for your generosity of time, talent and treasure.

Now to our 2018 budget. As this writing, our potential total income is \$371,066 with potential expenses is \$373,907, which shows a shortage of \$2,841 (rounded). This shortage may be reduced because Anne Gross estimates that we have 73 pledges for 2018 – we hope more come in during December. Our budget is pretty tight and the vestry tries really hard to make sure we follow within it's guidelines. The Finance Committee also reviews monthly reports on our funds and operating income and expenses. Your pledge is 86% of our income with the rest coming from fundraising, facility rentals, cash donations, and other miscellaneous income. So, your pledge is important to keeping our parish vital and strong within the community. Thank you, and you are an amazing group of people!!

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

What has been done in 2017 at MSPP:

One of the objectives of our Capital Campaign was to make necessary repairs to the Chapels and the Parish Hall. Thanks to your generosity we have been able to carry out that wish at each of the facilities this year. In addition to routine maintenance we have accomplished the following:

St. Peter's Chapel-

- Repaired Roof leak at the chimney
- New heating system
- New Hot Water system

Middleham Chapel-

- Painted windows and doors
- Made emergent repairs to heating and ventilating system
- Began installing new energy efficient lighting inside
- Scheduled roof repairs to be completed by the end of the year

Parish Hall-

- Increased the Parking area behind the Parish Hall with the help of a Grant from SMILE
- Replaced the sign at the entrance
- Installed new energy efficient windows
- Repaired basement leaks
- Abated insect damage found during the window replacement
- Installed much needed AC/Heat in basement
- Purchased and installed a new stove with Grant money
- Completed emergent AC/Heat repairs in the office area
- Currently completing roof repairs which included fixing leaks, addition of new soffits and facia and new gutters and downspouts on south side of the building.

This has been a very busy year. Moving into 2018 our plans include a Kitchen Renovation, which will be completed with mainly volunteer support. More to come on this project as dates are finalized. Thanks again to everyone for their help and support in completing these much-needed projects.

Two Events not to be

Missed

Father Richard Rohr asks," If we believe that God operates as me, God operates as thee too and his playing field for all is level, then why do racism and privilege still exist in our communities?" This is the context for the three parts of the Annual Big Conversation this year. Each part is designed to be independent of the others.

Part I: The Book Study on *Living into God's Dream: Dismantling Racism in America* edited by Catherine Meeks was a huge success. Over sixty people from the parish and the community participated with an average Sunday attendance of 35. The group was diverse in race and age. The Wednesday online Facebook discussion group had 22 register with an average of 9 participating per week. Much of the success of the book study sessions is directly attributed to the guest discussion leaders who were well prepared and brought a variety of insights to the conversation. The leaders were: David Deaderick, Vicki and Dusty Rhoades, Nancy Briggs, Josh Bowen, Megan Lewis, Lauretta Grier, Hugh and Diane Davies. The author/editor Catherine Meeks joined the last Sunday session, by phone, to answer questions. The Sunday sessions ended with participants expressing the desire to continue the conversation, many stating that they rarely had an opportunity to discuss racism with the "other" and wanting to learn more.

Part II: The Movie "13", December 3rd

Happening this week. A free screening of the documentary/film "**13**th" on December 3rd from 2 -5 p.m. in the Great Hall. An audience discussion of the film, led by members of the Community Mediation Group of Calvert Count, will follow. The documentary film "**13**th" explores the intersection of race, justice and mass incarceration in the United States. It is titled after the Thirteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution. This highly acclaimed documentary received numerous awards, including a nomination for an Academy Award. It offers a special opportunity to more deeply understand the background of today's issues concerning race, justice and the prison system. The film was created from the book, *The New Jim Crow* by Ava DuVernay, who directed "**Selma**".

Part III: The Annual Big Conversation, January 14th

Over the past seven years, Middleham and St. Peter's has offered an annual Big Conversation to its parishioners and the Southern Maryland community. The concept is to offer an opportunity to explore a national issue at our local level in an atmosphere of safe, civil discourse. Local leaders are invited to present their perspective on the issue and the audience has an opportunity to question and respond. The concept is to listen, talk and learn from one another in a respectful, civil manner. Many positive outcomes, that have improved the lives of people living in our communities, have evolved from these Big Conversations.

The title of this year's annual Big Conversation is, "I Didn't Know...Exploring Racism and Privilege in our Community". The Big Conversation Committee announced in 2016 that it was taking a year to study and learn about racism in Southern Maryland. As they did so, one expression continually came forth, "I didn't know that." We began to realize that many in our community were also unaware of daily racism. We also became aware that many of us rarely have the opportunity for an extended conversation about racism with "each other – Black and White". Thus evolved, "I Didn't Know...Exploring Racism and Privilege in our Community".

The Annual Big Conversation is on Sunday, January 14, 2018 in the Great Hall from 2-5p.m.

Community leaders will set the stage by briefly presenting their perspectives. Then, in small groups, participants will have the opportunity to talk and listen to one another, sharing their experiences and telling their stories. In the groups, we will learn about how racism and privilege operate in Southern Maryland and what is being or can be done. Trained facilitators from the Community Mediation Groups of Calvert and St. Mary's Counties will lead the groups. Finally, returning to the large group, we will look toward establishing next steps.

Planning for a New School Nursing Program in Haiti Under Way

The parish's Haiti School Nurse team is pleased to announce that planning is under way for nursing to be provided to students at three schools in Leogane, Haiti. The new program is being undertaken through an agreement between our parish and the Episcopal Nursing School in Leogane. The school's name in French is Faculté des Sciences Infirmières de l'Université Episcopale d'Haïti, or FSIL, which is much easier to pronounce and remember.

This new project builds on the three years that the parish supported a school nursing program in La Resurrection Parish in Gros Morne. The new program comes after extensive study by the team, including meetings and conversations with officials at the George Washington U. School of Nursing, the University of Michigan School of Nursing and the Haiti Nursing Foundation. FSIL is the top nursing school in Haiti and the only four-year baccalaureate program. Initial plans are for a two-year project bringing health care to 600 children. Led by a certified nurse and graduate of FSIL, health care will also be provided by third year students in their community health course. Over the coming three months, full detail for the program will be developed. The health care for children will begin with the school year in October. The program design calls for 1) immediate care for students, 2) health assessments for all students, 3) health education for students and parents, and 4) linking students and families to other health resources.

The development of the project has benefited greatly from the support of FSIL Dean Hilda Alcindor and Board Chair Dr. Jessie Colon. Information on FSIL and the Haiti Nursing Foundation can be found at https://www.haitinursing.org/. Information about Dr. Colon can be found at https://www.barry.edu/health-sciences/faculty/jcolin.html.

The long-term objective of this project is to model how school nursing can bring health care to children in Haiti. Children in Haiti have the worst health conditions of any country in the Western Hemisphere. One in five children do not live to the age of five. Our initial three-year project resulted in two new school nurse programs starting in Hinche and Bondeau. Longer term we hope many more schools will adopt school nursing.

We will keep you informed as the project continues.
