

Slow Down. Quiet. Its Advent

For several years now, *Forward Movement Publishers* has come out with just the thing for harried, super-stressed-out Christmas Shoppers: A large, one-page Calendar--suitable for placing in a well-trafficked spot in your home entitled, *Slow Down. Quiet. Its Advent*: (Twenty-four Days and Ways to Turn to Jesus.) The season of Advent (for all of you Latin scholars out there, from *Adventus* = coming) marks a new beginning in

the on-going cycle of the Church's year; with the First Sunday of Advent (Dec. 1st) we begin the Church's "New Year." When fully embraced, Advent is meant to be a quieter, more reflective time of the year-when we anticipate and give space to that great mystery of our faith, coming soon among us: The God-with-Us, *Emmanuel*, of Christmas. With the days growing ever shorter, even nature prods us to slow down, be quiet(er), and live into mystery. But, how many of us *really* feel up to doing any of this?

Enter a prop: The Calendar. The one with the catch-y mantra: *Slow Down. Quiet. Its Advent*. If you do nothing else this Advent, repeat to yourself this simple mantra: Slow down. Take the time to be quiet(er)-amidst the cacophony of sounds ringing in your ears. And remember after all: Its Advent. A time to prepare our hearts for the Christ-to-be-Born-Anew...in *us*.

This year, Anne Hayes is making sure that each of the Sunday School children go home with a <u>Slow</u> <u>Down. Quiet. Its Advent-Calendar</u>. The calendars will also be in the back of each of our churches, i.e., the Chapels, and Smith Hall, so that everyone can take one home. As you look at each day, one day at a time, there's a thought, or an activity, or an idea, or a prompt-for you to consider...just for the day. Unlike the Advent Calendars you may be used to from childhood, there is no chocolate bit that pops out as you move from day to day. So, take one home-and see if it doesn't help you to keep Advent a bit more intentionally, reverently, quietly.

Henri J.M. Nouwen, in one of his Prayers and Reflections for the Advent Season (*Be With Me, Lord*, c. 1998) has this to say: *Lord, Help me to Avoid Being Too Busy for You*. ..*I do not want you to pass me by. I do not want to be so busy with my way of living, my plans and projects, my relatives, my friends, my acquaintances, that I do not even notice that you are with me, closer to me than anyone else*... Try living this way, this Advent-and see if it doesn't make a difference to your Christmas.



Baby Shark Frenzy

Is there nothing the Baby Shark cannot do? It gives both amusement and annoyance to parents of young children everywhere, it brought the Nationals to a World Series Win, and it is currently being used to teach young children how to do CPR.

The song "Baby Shark" has a rate of 100 beats per minute, and using this song, children can sing the song and do compressions at the rate that the Red Cross recommends. The idea of using a song is not a new concept, prior to Baby Shark the Bee Gee's "Staying Alive", Abba's "Dancing Queen" and Star Wars "Imperial March", all have been used to help people remember the correct rate to perform compressions. At the beginning of the year Parish Health will be offering course on Hands Only CPR. This is an information only course that despite not giving a certification, it will give you the knowledge and ability to perform CPR in a safe and effect way.

Be on the lookout, CPR shark is in the water and will be heading our way soon.

The Community Life Center of Southern Calvert County (CLC)

What is this?

You may have heard this mentioned around church. The CLC is a 501c3, a non-profit, which began in 2017 to help support some of the outreach programs at Middleham and St. Peter's Parish and other programs in So. MD that provide food and/or health needs for the less fortunate.

Why?

Many times, we are asked to contribute to the ministries of the church, SMILE or other community organizations. Although the CLC is always open to contributions and encourage them, we primarily look to big businesses that are willing to help communities.

What have they done?

Since 2017, we have had programs for Substance Abuse, sponsored Health Fairs, Mental Health First Aid courses, the Health Dept's food tasting and recipes for the food drops, the Heartfelt Backpack programs, Free Flu and Pneumonia shots, and Dental Clinic programs. We have also helped with the purchase of a kitchen stove to demonstrate how clients can prepare the food provided during the monthly distribution program.

What else is planned?

In the future we hope to have more free Vaccine clinics, another Mental Health First Aid course and continue to raise funds to help other community events. Middleham and St. Peter's Picnic Shelter Eagle Scout Project

My name is Cody Gronda. I am 17 years old and I'm a Boy Scout with Troop 1684 chartered out of Middleham and St. Peter's Episcopal Church. For my final Eagle Scout Project, I chose to build a 14' x 20' picnic shelter. The picnic shelter will help the members of the Church by allowing them to have meetings and social events outdoors without the fear of getting rained out. I got the project approved by the Troop and Mr. Jim Yoe from the Church.

I learned a lot about getting building permits from the County and I'd like to thank Mr. Hawxhurst and Mr. Gary Brady from Permits and Inspections who helped me fill out the permit forms and also helped me with the picnic shelter design details to meet building code requirements.

84 Lumber (Zach, Sean and Christopher) helped me get a very generous donation of building materials. 84 Lumber likes helping Eagle Scouts because their owner is an Eagle Scout, too!

Unfortunately, right after I got the building permit in March 2018, I injured my hand real bad during wrestling at Patuxent High School and I had to delay the project for several months due to hand surgery and physical therapy.

We finally got to work in the Fall of 2018 digging the footers for the picnic shelter's poles. After we dug the footer holes, we had to have them inspected to make sure we dug them deep enough. Unfortunately, it rained the night before the inspection and filled the holes with water and we failed the inspection. I had to reschedule the build plan until the holes were pumped out and successfully reinspected.





I was originally going to buy 6x6 poles for the picnic shelter, but my Uncle Ray donated recycled treated dock poles that were much sturdier and will last a lot longer. Mr. Rich Gorman, a retired Navy Construction SeaBee, seriously helped out during the project. He helped me make sure the poles were set squarely, plum and all level trimmed to the same height.



Then, wrestling season started again in the Fall and with tournaments and matches set for every weekend, it was hard to schedule build sessions. It didn't help any when it rained a lot of the weekends, too. But, we did get back to work and set the main support beams one weekend.



Then it was time to install the roof. I learned how to set the "king posts" that the ends of the main roof beam sit on and then we got to work cutting and installing the 2x6 trusses for the roof. Uncle Ray also donated a recycled metal roof which is better than the wood slats roof I originally planned because it will last longer and it won't have to be repainted every year. After the trusses were set, we installed the perlins for the metal roofing.



The metal roof and gable were installed with special screws/gaskets so it doesn't leak.




Now, we were was almost done. The last thing we installed were stringers to brace the structure as well as hurricane straps so the roof doesn't get blown off during high winds. The bracing and hurricane straps were building code requirements. Then, we called for final inspection.

The final inspection was successful on 29 October 2019 and Mr. Yoe signed off on my Eagle Scout Picnic Shelter Project for Middleham and St. Peter's right after that.

In the end, 9 Scouts, 4 Adult Leaders and 2 other Adults contributed a total of 258 hours of labor to this Picnic Shelter project and I am very thankful and grateful for everyone's help!


