# Howard Thurman and The Work of Christmas

These early days of 2019 find us still in the Christmas season. The twelve days of Christmas carry us all the way through the Feast of the Epiphany on January 6<sup>th</sup> when what are the men from the East arrive to pay homage to the young Prince of Peace. As decorations are packed away, family heads back home, and the rest of the world turns its gaze away from Bethlehem, the words of Howard Thurman speak to me. Thurman, born in 1900, was raised by his grandmother who was a former slave. He would go on to become an author, theologian, mystic, and serve as the dean of Rankin Chapel at Howard University and at Boston University's Marsh Chapel. Thurman is also considered a forefather of the Civil

Rights Movement. His writings such as *Jesus and the Disinherited* and his steadfast commitment to bring people together across racial, cultural and religious lines helped sow the seeds for leaders such as Martin Luther King, Jr. to emerge.

Howard Thurman's poem *The Work of Christmas* is a poignant and powerful offering as we enter this new year.

When the song of the angels is stilled,

When the star in the sky is gone,

When the kings and princes are home,

When the shepherds are back with their flock,

The work of Christmas begins:

To find the lost,

To heal the broken,

To feed the hungry,

To release the prisoner,

To rebuild the nations,

To bring peace among people,

To make music in the heart.

The wonder of Christmas is remembering God taking on human flesh, coming to live and dwell among us, to live and die as one of us. The work of Christmas is never forgetting the great gift and responsibility this leaves each of us to receive as we continue to follow Jesus in the way of love.

This month, there are several ways the work of Christmas will continue in our own community in which your voice and presence are needed. Perhaps before you turn the page and move on to the next article, you might re-read Thurman's poem. Then, say a prayer or hold a moment of silence asking God how you might continue the work of Christmas in this place at this time. How can you be a bearer of hope and joy to others in a world that desperately needs it? Listen, listen, and listen again. Then let the Spirit guide you.

# Annual Meeting and Joint Worship Service January 27, 2019 @ 9:30am in Smith Hall






#### Sunday 1/20: Celebrating the Season of Light



# **Your Parish Health Committee:**



As we wind up the 2018 year, I thought I'd list some of our programs we have provided this year. In January we helped with the **Point in Time Count**- this

is where we help the county and state see how many home-less we have in our county so we can provide services for them. April had us having a program on **Active Shooters** and also a **Mental Health First Aid Course**.

In June we provided a **CPR/AED** class for those who wanted to become or renew certification. In September was the **Health Fair**- where a new service was provided- Flu and Pneumonia shots- Free! In October and December, we had programs on **Domestic Violence**- a problem increasing in our counties.

We have also worked with the Health Dept. to give healthy recipes at the food drops, Hep A vaccines as needed and we continue to provide BP checks at our churches and at SMILE. We encourage all who want to make Prayer Shawls and Red, White and Blue lap robes for Veterans.

In 2019, we hope to expand our programs and are looking for ideas. In February we plan on a program on Pets- "Do Pets have Souls?" and others are on the table. ## **Our School Nurse Team Goes to Haiti**

On December 3-6, 2018 representatives of the Middleham and St. Peter's Haiti School Nurse Program traveled to Leogane, Haiti to review and support the project. Hugh Davies, Dale Yoe, and Diane Davies met with the lead project officials, the nurses, the school directors and children. The goal of the program is to model the successful delivery of health services and education to children through school nursing. MSP started the project in 2011 in Gros Morne, demonstrating in the 3 ½ years of operation that the model works. Since then, the model has been replicated at two additional locations – Hinche and Bondeau. Working with the Episcopal University School of Nursing in Leogane (FSIL), the current phase is intended to institutionalize the approach through the successful delivery of health services at three schools, showing their success through evaluation, and sustaining and replicating the approach across Haiti.

Here are the team's observations on the visit:

Conditions in Leogane remain difficult for the population now eight years after the earthquake. Leogane was the epicenter of the earthquake. In a region of 130,000, 20,000 were killed. Health care remains as a major challenge.

The project nurses are excellent - Yola Clervil is on the left and Fabiola Rejouis on the right.

Fabiola is the lead. She is a nurse practitioner and a graduate and employee of FSIL. She lives in Leogane and attended Abellard School from Kindergarten through high school graduation.

Abellard is one of the three schools in the



project. The nurses are being assisted by three third year nursing students from FSIL. The project is well under way at the three schools, Abellard – a private school, Ste. Croix – an Episcopal school, and Ste. Rose of Lima – a Catholic school. The first step at each school was

to obtain parental permission, then to undertake an initial health assessment of each child in the primary grades.

FSIL gives every indication of being a strong partner. It has 130 undergraduate nursing students and is the only four-year baccalaureate nursing program in Haiti. It is regarded as the best school of nursing in Haiti. Pictured at the left are Dean Hilda Alcindor and Board Chair and President Dr. Jessie Colin. Dr. Colin is recently retired as director of Miami-based Barry University's PhD, nursing executive leadership, and



nursing education programs. Both leaders are committed to the project. We have a shared vision of reaching out to the community through school nursing and sustaining and replicating the model. Dr. Colin will lead the evaluation of the project. With FSIL as the foundation, we have a good start toward our objective of institutionalizing the model.

The directors of the three schools are on board. Each school has set aside excellent space for the infirmary – the nurse's office. The faculties have been informed about the project, and initial steps taken to obtain parent permissions. School Directors are enthusiastic about the health care coming to the schools. The program is at an early stage. Assessments will be extended to include hearing and vision. Education programs need to be more fully developed. Plans are under way to assure that all children are vaccinated and treated for stomach worms. The objective is to have healthier children with less absences and improved academic performance.



## **Calvert County Homeless Shelter**

ECHO House is Calvert County's homeless shelter. Located in Prince Frederick, it is a non-profit ecumenical organization supported by over 20 Calvert County churches. Since 2003, we have provided the evening meal on the fourth Monday of every month. Many parishioners, individually or in groups – including our youth groups – have fixed meals.

Meals can be simple – a casserole or soup, or it can be a meat-starch-vegetable meal. Generally a dessert and a gallon or two of some sort of juice or milk are included. What complicates the meal is that there typically are about 40 residents in the shelter. It is becoming common for two or three families to get together to do a meal. Thanks to a grant from the Endowment Fund, \$40 can be reimbursed per month to someone making a meal. ## **Books & Banter Mystery Book Club**"




