Life as an individual or a community and especially as a follower of Jesus can be a paradox. On the one hand it is as simple as the words of Jesus.....Love the Lord your God with all you heart, mind and soul and love your neighbor as yourself. On the other side the paradox becomes more of a mystery and perhaps a bit more tedious and complicated.

Frederick Buechner offers us some insight into such a journey. Whatever life brings to you, boredom, pain, excitement, or gladness, embrace it in a close up and personal way...touch, taste, and smell. You can't just think your way to community. It is a messy, and complicated process. Either as an individual or a community, it means this journey is personal and all pervasive.

David Oliver, father of Diane Davies and a member of this parish was buried out of Middleham Chapel on May 17. In a sermon he gave at the Lake of the Woods Church, he talked about three key elements when you consider the Christian life. He emphasized all three are essential and interlocking. First, an acceptance of God's amazing generous love for you and the world. Second, God gives every one of us talents, and third, we have time...the living of our lives. He closed his sermon with a challenge to his church family: be generous with your love and use your talents and abilities and time to be of service to others in the world. That is what being faithful is all about for a Christian.

In the coming weeks and months, the congregation of Middleham and St. Peters will be called upon as individuals and as a community of faith to listen to your life and to explore the mystery of it as a people of God. It may be exciting, painful, and full of hope and gladness, maybe not much boredom. My prayer is that it will be a time of entering into that great mystery of what it means to live in Christian community with grace, and to explore the challenge of David Oliver to embrace God's love as a catalysis to be of service to the community and the larger world.

All proceeds to benefit Project Echo, providing hope for the homeless in Calvert County.

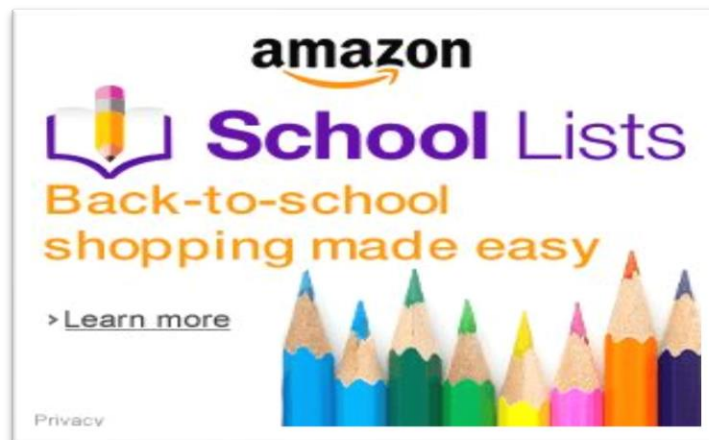


Treasurer's Corner

It is with a delighted heart that I share the news that the Commission of Ministry in the Diocese of Maryland has recommended me to be a Postulant to the Priesthood. As a Postulant, I will be able to formally pursue Seminary with the intent to become ordained as a Priest in the Episcopal Church. I plan to apply to Virginia Theological Seminary in the Fall of 2020 and to enroll in their Divinity Program. In between now and seminary I plan to participate in the John Hopkins Clinical Pastoral Education program at Anne Arundel Medical Center, where I will be trained in Pastoral Care as an Intern Chaplin for those in need of spiritual care at the hospital. The road to discernment has been a long time in the making, and my heart is full of gratitude for the role that Middleham and St Peters played in allowing me to “try on” the liturgical aspects of preaching and serving at the altar. One of the challenges for me in discerning this call to ministry was that of being terrified of public speaking--in my short time at Middleham and St Peters the congregation provided a supportive environment to work through my discomfort of delivering a sermon... not that my knees still don’t shake when I am behind the podium... but with the encouragement of your loving community, I was able to rise up to the Call that the Spirit was inviting me to--a huge thanks for being that kind of sponsoring parish. I hold you dear in my hearts, and I am hoping to see you all in the Fall.

Letter from Dr. Laura M. Carpenter

Dear Friends,



As many of you know, I have been in the deacon formation program through the Diocese of Maryland for the last three years. This May, I completed the congregational internship requirement at St. George's, Valley Lee and Ascension, in Lexington Park. My experience there enriched and shaped my formation in ways that I could never imagine. As someone who grew up attending Middleham and St. Peter's, I found myself dreading this part of my formation, afraid of leaving home and questioning whether I had any gifts that I could share with a different community. One of the many things that I found I enjoy about the diaconate is the opportunity to preach, and I was particularly struck by the gospel that served as the basis for my final sermon on May 5. The reading for that day, John 21:1-19 served as a great reflection on not just Peter's spiritual journey, but my own as well. In that reading, right on the heels of Thomas, we were presented with the story of Peter, another character in the Gospel of John often misinterpreted. If Thomas was the doubter, Peter, then, was the denier.

In the aftermath of the crucifixion and resurrection, Peter and the disciples were still in shock and mourning the loss of their friend, Jesus. They had spent the last three and a half years of their lives following him, listening to his teachings, and witnessing miracles. They watched as he was crucified by the Romans and died. Their mourning was interrupted by two brief miraculous appearances, but their joy was cut short when Jesus would disappear again. Not knowing when or if they would see their friend and teacher again, the disciples were unsure as to what to do next. This is understandable.

Equally understandable is their desire to do something, to go back to the familiar, so Simon Peter suggested fishing. Peter and the disciples spent some time that day on the Sea of Galilee. It was hot and the disciples' hearts probably weren't completely on task. They were still mourning. To make matters worse, they weren't catching anything. All day long, they cast their heavy nets only pull them back empty. Just as they were about to give up, they heard a voice calling to them. They didn't recognize the figure on the beach at first, and were surprised when they heard the stranger tell them to cast their net to the other side of the boat. In a leap of faith, or perhaps desperation, the disciples heeded the advice and their return

was a catch more abundant than any they had ever hoped for. After this, Simon recognized the figure as Jesus, and he jumped from the boat and swam to the shore in excitement to get to his friend.

What happened next is a private conversation between Peter and Jesus in which Peter is given three opportunities to openly express his love for him. On first read, we want this story to be one of forgiveness, and perhaps this can be argued. On closer reading, however, you will notice that the word forgiveness doesn't pop up anywhere. Can you imagine what Peter must have felt in the days following Jesus's crucifixion? The guilt, shame, and vulnerability that came from denying Jesus three times during his trial? Now, standing in front of Jesus, Peter was given a chance to finally redeem himself to his friend and to his fellow disciples. And so each of the three times that he was asked whether he loved Jesus, he responded yes and was called again to discipleship. Tend my sheep, Jesus says, Feed my sheep. And so, while it makes sense that this has to be the moment when Peter is forgiven in front of the others, nowhere in the story does Jesus utter the words, "I forgive you." Perhaps this is because Peter hasn't done anything deserving of Jesus' forgiveness. No, the person who needs to forgive Peter, well, is Peter himself. So now we get to the root of the real issue behind Peter's grief, sadness, guilt, shame, and vulnerability.

And forgiveness is, perhaps, not the only issue in this story either. Forgiveness is a crowd favorite for masking what really needs to happen, what is really needed to fix a relationship, especially to mend this specific relationship. A little more digging and some careful study might tell us that what Peter really needs is to accept who Jesus needs him to be. A rereading of Peter's denial in John exposes his true rejection -- that of his own identity. The question asked of Peter is not, as it is in the Synoptic Gospels, "do you know the man?" To which Peter responds, "I don't know him." Rather, in the Fourth Gospel, the inquiry posed to Peter is, "aren't you one of his disciples?" Peter's response? "I am not." Armed with this information, the conversation between Jesus and Peter takes on a completely different meaning both for Peter and for us. Jesus does not blame or shame Peter. Jesus does not ask for Peter's repentance. Jesus doesn't ask three times, "Peter, do you love me?" to remind him of his three-fold denial, to test him or to trap him. Instead, Jesus reaffirms who Peter needs to be; the disciple Jesus needs him to be. And the disciple Jesus needs Peter to be is the shepherd now.

I watched a special on Netflix recently which featured Brene Brown, a research professor at the University of Houston. Dr. Brown has spent the past two decades studying courage, vulnerability, shame, and empathy and is the author of five #1 New York Times best sellers. Her Ted Talk about the Power of Vulnerability has been viewed more than 35 million times. In her documentary, A Call to Courage, she mentions the effect that the phrase "Daring Greatly" from Theodore Roosevelt's speech "Citizenship in a

Republic” has had on her life. The speech, sometimes referred to as “The Man in the Arena,” was delivered at the Sorbonne in Paris, France, on April 23, 1910. This is the passage that made the speech famous:

“It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring Greatly....”

Dr. Brown highlights this quote as the definition of everything her research taught her about vulnerability. She argues that vulnerability is not knowing victory or defeat, it’s understanding the necessity of both; it’s **ENGAGING**. It’s being **ALL IN**. Vulnerability is not weakness, and the uncertainty, risk, and emotional exposure we face every day are not optional. Our only choice is a question of engagement. Our willingness to own and engage with our vulnerability determines the depth of our courage and the clarity of our purpose; the level to which we protect ourselves from being vulnerable is a measure of our fear and Disconnection, and in the case of Peter, Denial.

The truth is, when we spend our lives waiting until we’re perfect or bulletproof before we walk into the arena, we ultimately sacrifice relationships and opportunities that may not be recoverable, we squander our precious time, and we turn our backs on our gifts, those unique contributions that only we can make.

She goes on to argue that “perfect” and “bulletproof” are seductive traits, but they don’t exist in the human experience. We must walk into the arena, whatever it may be—a new relationship, an important meeting, our creative process, a difficult family conversation, or even our own discipleship—with courage and the willingness to engage. Rather than sitting on the sidelines and hurling judgment and advice, we must dare to show up and let ourselves be seen. This is vulnerability. This is daring greatly.

This research, I believe, can be applied to John’s gospel about Peter. The challenge and call to discipleship that Jesus is offering to Peter and to us. We play it safe a lot in our lives, picking and choosing

who gets to see our most authentic selves. The danger is this: if this is the way we feel with people in our lives, even those closest to us, perhaps the same is true of our relationship with Jesus.

Our first thought about Peter when it comes to the decision he had to make around that charcoal fire is that he was terrified that what had happened to Jesus would happen to him. Maybe Peter was reluctant to admit his calling, his identity, because he wasn't ready yet -- not that you ever can be, really. Maybe Peter couldn't affirm his identity because the garden was too fresh in his mind, too painful, too personal. Maybe Peter was not able to say, "I AM" because he just couldn't believe it himself.

I wonder when, not if, we have felt the same. We just can't imagine that Jesus would commend us with being the good shepherd when he can no longer be. We cannot believe that Jesus could believe in us.

And so, Jesus shows up on that shore for Peter, hosts a meal one more time, and tells Peter, tells **US**, "I believe in you. I know who you are and I love you. And yes, you are exactly the disciple I need, the disciple the world needs."

So how about it? Are you ready to Dare Greatly? Are you ready to engage and accept discipleship and Dare Greatly to change this world and to champion for all of God's sheep? In the next few months, Middleham and St. Peter's Parish will be called to work toward restaffing and reorganization. This will call for change and will present opportunities for both challenge and vulnerability. Like Peter, it's time to accept this opportunity to point to, name, and work through this vulnerability in order to live more fully into accepting the call to discipleship, to become the shepherd in Jesus's absence, so that when asked "aren't you one of his disciples, you can answer with a resounding "I AM."

Three years ago, I was called to pursue the diaconate, to explore my faith, identify my own strengths and weaknesses, and risk the unknown in pursuit of a different type of discipleship. While I had my own fears about my own self-worth, denial of possessing any gift for ministry, and certainly felt vulnerable, I heard a voice on a shore that I'm not sure I recognized. It encouraged me to cast my net to the other side of the boat. To fish differently, and to engage in a way that I had never done before. What resulted was a catch more abundant than I could ever have imagined. Middleham and St. Peter's Parish has been unwavering in its support of this call, and thank God for that. Thank you for that.

I can't believe its already time for the summer Connector. As we bring Spring to a close, I feel we should go through our Summer watch list.

First- remember to keep well hydrated- getting dehydrated can lead to all kinds of health problems, including heat stroke and death. Make sure you drink plenty of water, and stay as cool as possible.

Watch for ticks-which are really prevalent this year.

1. **Lyme disease-** From the National Capital Lyme DiPrevention is the key
 - a. Avoid wooded and bushy areas with high grass and leaf litter; Walk in the center of trails.
 - b. **Repel** Ticks with DEET or Permethrin
 - c. Find and Remove Ticks from Your Body- remember **DO NOT USE NAIL POLISH, PETROLEUM JELLY, ALCOHOL OR HEAT TO REMOVE THE TICK. DO NOT TWIST, JERK OR SQUEEZE THE BODY OF THE TICK; GRASP THE TICK CLOSE TO THE SKIN SURFACE AND PULL STRAIGHT UP AND OUT.**
 - d. Bathe or shower as soon as possible after coming indoors (preferably within 2 hours) to wash off and more easily find ticks that are crawling on you.
 - e. Conduct a full-body tick check using a hand-held or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body upon return from tick-infested areas. Parents should check their children for ticks under the arms, in and around the ears, inside the belly button, behind the knees, between the legs, around the waist, and especially in their hair.
 - f. Examine gear and pets. Ticks can ride into the home on clothing and pets, then attach to a person later, so carefully examine pets, coats, and day packs.
 - g. Tumble clothes in a dryer on high heat for an hour to kill remaining ticks. (Some research suggests that shorter drying times may also be effective, particularly if the clothing is not wet.)
2. **Use sunscreen- Avoid getting too much sun-** the sun's ultraviolet rays can damage your skin in as little as 15 minutes. Try to follow simple rules:
 - a. Seek shade- under trees, umbrella, or any kind of shelter.
 - b. Wear clothing with uv protection and don't forget a hat!
 - c. Sunglasses will protect those sensitive eyes
 - d. **SUNSCREEN!** a must!!!!

From our lead nurse

I am Horldine Fabiola Réjouis, holding a masters of nursing care as a Family Nurse Practitioner.

Working as a nurse in a school nursing program allows me to use my training in service to my community and to my country.

Within the framework of my job as a school nurse, I work in close collaboration with the directors of the schools, the teachers, the students and the parents. I administer first aid when necessary and, in collaboration with the teachers, if there is a student who has a particular problem, I make sure the problem is resolved. When necessary I contact the parents.

I firmly believe that education about hygiene can change peoples' lives, especially the lives of children, and that is why I place special importance on it. Therefore I make sure the children are trained about a plan of hygiene and I always ask them to share what they have learned with their parents.

A similar program should be in place at all schools and at every level.

I want to thank Middleham and St. Peter's Parish, the benefactors, the givers for their contribution to this program that is so important for our children. With this program, we hope to have many more leaders able to ensure the continuation of better health when we go to meet our maker.

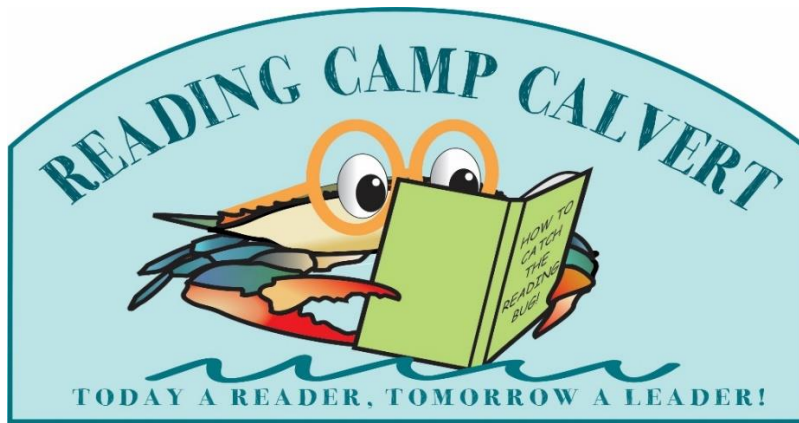

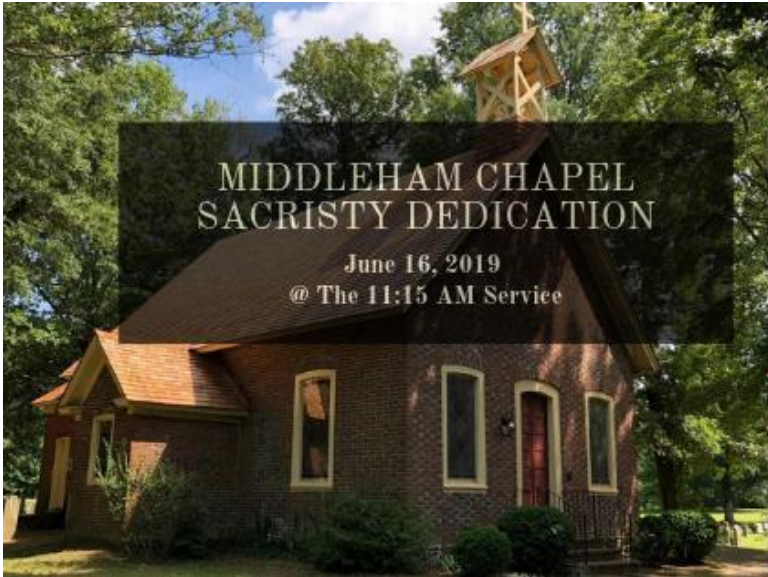

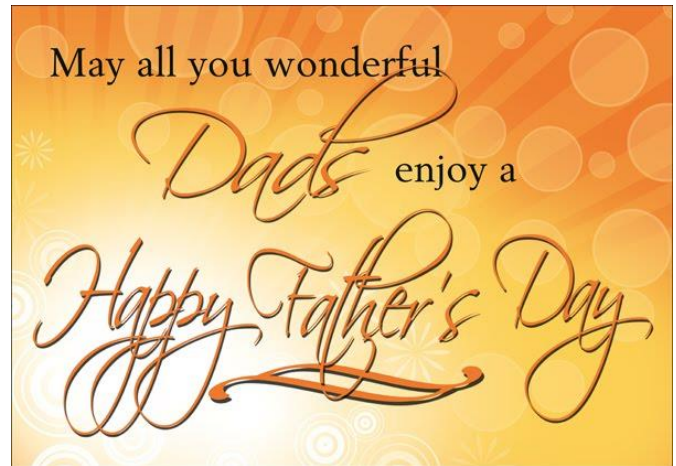

Tips To Keep Your Pet Safe



1. Make sure before the 4th your pet is wearing license and ID tags just in case they get lost.
2. Make sure their microchip registration is up to date.
3. Take a current photo of your pet "just in case" they get lost.
4. Exercise your pets early in the day before the fireworks begin.
5. Leave your pet at home during fireworks. Do not leave them in a fenced yard. Panicked dogs hurt themselves trying to escape fenced yards.
6. Keep your pet inside & turn on the air conditioner, TV or radio to drown out the noise of fireworks. Give them a treat or toy to keep them busy.
