Southern Maryland Town Hall Meeting



On September 29th, 2019 from 2-4 pm Middleham and St. Peter's hosted a Town Hall Meeting the subject of which was, Maryland's Schools: A Blueprint for the Future. The Big Conversation event provided an opportunity for our Southern Maryland community to learn more about plans for where are schools are headed during the next ten years and beyond. In 2016, Governor Hogan formed the Commission on Innovation and Excellence in Education and appointed William E. "Brit" Kirwan as chairman. The report from this commission is known as the "Kirwan Report." 110 people listened attentively and asked questions as presenters Dr. Brit Kirwan and Dr. David Hornbeck, former Maryland State Superintendent of Schools led the discussion about the findings and recommendations of the report, now law, and what it will take to fully implement it.

Christian Formation Children & Youth

As October falls upon us, the youth of the parish is in full bloom. We have Christian Formation running every Sunday for children preschool through high school, all classrooms are located in the basement at our Smith Hall location. During joint services classes will begin at 10 am to coincide with the start time of the service.

On October 27, all middle school and high school students will have the opportunity to look for apparitions during youth group. We will be doing our traditional scavenger hunt through the graveyard, while telling ghost stories. In the morning our class time will be focused around Ghosts and Spirits, and allowing the students to determine what their belief in the afterlife entails. The elementary students will continue their work through Holy Moly, with stories about Rebekah and Isaac, Jacob and Esau, and Joseph. To get in the holiday spirit with your younger ghouls, please joint us on October 26th at 2 pm for our Annual Trunk or Treat. A quick note on the distinctions of Christian Formation and Youth Group: Christian Formation, or sometimes called Sunday School, is the class time that runs from 10:30 – 11:30 on a regular Sunday schedule. It is on Sunday mornings and is more concentrated around biblical teaching. In Elementary classes, they are learning the stories and doing activities centered around the stories. For the Middle and High School Students, they are drawing their thoughts and ideas about the way the story plays out, it is more focused on the validity of the story and how it related to where they are in their current walks of life. Youth Group is a once a month meeting on a Sunday Evening, usually from 5-7 pm. Youth Group is a place for youth to hang out and play games, talk and get to know each other. It is more about being present in a Christian environment than it is about theological teachings. WE want to see kids happy and having fun, and sometimes we get to do really cool things. I encourage any and all teens that you know to join us, the more the merrier.

Parish Health Ministry

"I don't think of all the misery, but of the beauty that still remains" – Anne Frank

Anne Frank was on to something, sometimes it's not about the bad that has happened, but the good and beautiful things that come from it all. Regular people that step up and act as heroes in times that are so dark, and people feel so helpless. As a community, we have done an excellent job at recognizing where we can be part of something beautiful. In the health world, specifically, we have done an amazing job at seeing a need and teaching ourselves how to fulfill it. We learned that teaching CPR and having AEDs on site saved lives, and most people are certified in CPR or at least have a working knowledge of the actions that need to take place. In the last decade we have educated ourselves through the Opioid Epidemic, most of the general public understands the use of Narcan, and how to administer it during an over dose. In the current temperature and climate of society, the newest push given to the general public is the application of tourniquets. When I originally took EMT, 17 years ago, it was taught as a skill that we would probably never use. Through out the years we had gotten the newest and latest information, training and technology, based on the military and what they had success with while in combat. Tourniquets are a crucial element to those who have experienced grave trauma, it is the difference of life and death, and there is a rise in the need to educate people how to apply them. There was once a time that combat was something you were drafted for, or something you willingly signed up for. Those days are gone. The applications of tourniquets have grossly increased with the violent acts carried out in some of the most mundane of places. Tourniquets are being applied to concert goers, Walmart shoppers, worshippers, and students that just wanted to learn. On October 19th, our parish will be presenting Stop The Bleed, and I would love for all of you to come out, educate yourself and become someone's beauty buried in their misery. ~ Anne Hayes for Parish Health



What is Stop the Bleed?

We have had several programs on "How to save a life" and last year on "Active Shooter" and what to do. We need to learn more.

The only thing more tragic than a death from bleeding...

Is a death that could have been prevented.

Let's start in the beginning......

After the mass shootings at "Sandy Hook" and several others, thee American College of Surgeons and others realized that the primary cause of many of those deaths were from uncontrolled bleeding. Other injuries with loss of blood are auto accidents and mechanical accidents. The College of Surgeons and others believe that all citizens, in this day in age, learn to stop bleeding in the safest manner.

This course will be given at Middleham and St. Peter's Parish Hall on October 19th from 1000-1130. Registration **MUST** be on line at <u>https://www.huntingtownchurch.com</u> and is free. It invites not only parishioners, but many kids, families and friends from the community to come to our campus and gives us an opportunity to share MSP with them-- as we give out lots of Halloween treats!!!

Besides our outreach opportunities we have also done some "Inreach" as a new ministry for MSP. We haven't gone on any mission trips out of the area in several years, but rather we are lending a helping hand and have done some home repairs for our own parishioners instead.




